## <u>Irish Hereford Breed Society – Country report 2020</u>

#### World Hereford Conference 2020 New Zealand

The Irish Hereford Breed Society is more appreciative than ever after the year that has been to have been able to attend the 18<sup>th</sup> World Hereford Conference 2020 in Queenstown New Zealand. The Conference attracted nearly 400 visitors from 18 countries worldwide & with the line up that was presented it was no surprise it was so popular.

A major part of this conference was the Young Breeders Competition. Teams competed from around the globe including; New Zealand (2 teams), Australia (2 teams), USA, Denmark, UK, Sweden & Ireland. Team Ireland was represented by; Eoin Lynch (Team Leader), Sinead Conry, Michael Barrett & Katie Brady. The teams had a busy schedule for the week which included stud visits, a quiz, team bonding, presentations and butchering skills, farm business tasks, clipping competition, showmanship and stock judging.

Along with the conference agenda – extra tours and activities were organised to give attendees a look at some of the top Hereford studs across New Zealand as well as a taste of Kiwi culture & tourist attractions.

A major element of the World Hereford Conference is for the World Hereford Council to meet and discuss World Hereford matters & elect the incoming Secretary General, which this term is none other than the Irish Hereford Breed Society's very own; Mr. Larry Feeney, replacing the outgoing Secretary General Mr Jose (Pepe) Bonico from Uruguay. The conference finished up at the Wanaka A&P Show where the teams of Young Handlers competed in the show ring, followed by the Show of Hereford cattle. Congratulations to Team New Zealand on winning the Young Breeders Competition & Team Australia on placing Reserve Champions. Well done to our own Team; Eoin, Sinead, Michael & Katie on performing remarkably in all aspects of the competition.

### The Irish Farmers Journal THRIVE – Dairy Calf to beef Programme

The Irish Farmers Journal Thrive – Dairy Calf to beef Programme aims to demonstrate best practice for producing dairy calf to beef calves through the use of higher genetic merit AI sired beef calves along with focusing on a high level of efficiency in on farm nutrition and animal health. The demonstration farm is located in Tipperary, with 140 calves reared each year and being brought to slaughter between the ages of 18 to 21 months. The target for heifers is to slaughter at 275kg and at 19 months of age and the target for bullocks is to slaughter at 300kgs, at 19 months of ages also. The core aim on the farm is to slaughter as many of the 140 cattle as possible at the end of the second summer grazing period to avoid extra winter feeding costs. There have currently been 64 (2019 born) cattle slaughtered from the group to date. There are four breeds in the trial; Hereford, Angus, Limousin & Belgian Blue and The recently published results have proven to shine a very positive light on Herefords;

- 80% of the Hereford heifers which have already been slaughtered off grass along with 64% of Hereford bullocks having been finished off grass also.
- Meal intake is lowest for the Hereford heifers at an average of 171kgs. Hereford bulls are also at the lowest end of the scale with 233kgs compared to Angus and Limousin.
- The average slaughter weight for Hereford heifers was 532kgs with the average price being paid of €3.82/kg after a base price of €3.65/kg, quality assurance bonus of €0.20/kg and the Irish Hereford

Prime breed bonus of €0.10/kg also. This average price was the highest average price paid for heifers across the three breeds.

- The average carcase weight for Hereford bullocks was 316kg.
- There was a breed bonus paid for Hereford Heifers and Bullocks.
- The Hereford bullocks were also the best performing breed at finishing off grass, achieving over 1.04kg/day.

It is well known that Herefords are a sustainable choice; being an early maturing breed, they are much easier & quicker finished for slaughter off grass, without much extra feed needed and thus saving money. These results are the proof of the pudding and show just how well Hereford cattle are suited to a low cost, grass based system.

The Society is looking forward to the next round of results from this trial & value the research being carried out.

This smashing 5 star Terminal, son of Rossmore Nelson Mandela out of the homebred Tullaha Stephanie opened a spirited bidding match until the hammer dropped at €4,600. In fact, the under bidder had difficulty in gaining access to the bidding ring due to the cap on numbers around the ring. This fine bull has moved onto new pastures in neighbouring Tipperary.
